Simple Future Tense

We use Simple Future Tense to talk about an action that will occur in future.

Structure

positive-

Subject+ will+ verb (base form of the verb)





Ex- I will sing a song.
She will bake a cake.



Negative-

Subject+ will+ not+ verb


Ex- He will not go to school tomorrow.

She will not do exercises in the evening.

Question form?

Will+ subject+ verb

Ex- Will she pass the exam?



Question form- Negative

Will+ not+ subject+ verb

Ex- Will not / Won't he come to the party? Won't she finish her project?

| USAGE | EXAMPLES |
|---|--|
| Used to express predictions about future. | There will be next-generation robots in 2050. |
| To express future decisions. | I will attend a meeting next Monday. |
| To express promise or offer. | I will help you to cook meals. |
| To express actions that are not in our control. | It will be Sunday tomorrow. |

Future Progressive Tense

We use future progressive tense to talk about an action that will occur over a period of time at some point in the future.

Structure

Subject+ will +be + verb +ing

Ex- she will be <u>doing</u> her homework at night. He will be <u>going</u> to university next year.

Negative form

Subject+ will + not+ be+ verb+ ing

Ex- They will not be eating with us. She will not be arriving on time.

Question form- positive?

Will + subject+ be+ verb + ing

Ex- Will you be calling?
Will she be doing her presentation?

Future Perfect Tense

We use future perfect tense to talk about an action which is Promised to be done by a certain time in the future.

Structure-


Subject+ will+ have+ past participle of the verb

Ex- o1. She will have completed her project by Monday. o2. Before I go to see her, she will have left the place. o3. He will have cleaned the room before his father blames.

Negative form

Subject+ will+ not+ have+ past participle

Ex- She will not have applied for the post.
They will not have seen us.
He will not have bought a new laptop.



Question form?


Will+ subject+ have+ past participle.

Ex- Will they have bought a new car? Will he have written a poem? Will she have gone to France?



FUTURE PERFECT TENSE

He will have retired by the time he is 60.

Future Perfect Progressive Tense

This tense is used for an ongoing action that will be Completed at some specified time in the future.

Structure-



Subject+ will+ have+ been+ verb+ ing

Ex- I will have been working here for 3 years.

At 10 pm he will have been swimming for a two hours.

Negative form

Subject+ will+ not+ have+ been+ verb+ ing

Ex- He will not have been sleeping for four hours by midnight.

We will not have been studying here three years.

Question form

Will+ subject+ have+ been+ verb+ ing



Ex- Will they have been living here for five years? Will this plant have been growing for 20 years?



Future Perfect Progressive Tense

Will Have Been + Present Participle

Ongoing future activity ends here.

Past Present Future

Simple present tense



The simple present can be used to talk about future events which are part of a timetable.

Ex- The train leaves at half past six. The school starts at 7.30 am.



Present Progressive Tense

The present progressive is used mostly to talk about personal arrangements and fixed plans, especially when the time and place have been decided.

Ex- I am visiting my grandparents tomorrow. She is playing netball in the evening. They are watching a movie tonight.

Be going to

This structure is preferred in an informal style. It is also used to talk about pre-planned future events. Here the emphasis is on the idea of intention.

Ex- He is going to buy a new car. (he intends to buy a car sometime soon)

I am going to get a good job. She is going to have another baby. Thank you
