


Competency 5 Extracts necessary information from various types of texts. Competency Level -5.8 Recognises the organization of a text.

Rhyme

Rhyming words occur very often in poems, especially at the end of the lines

Alliteration

Repeating the same consonant sound

Hyperbole

Make qualities of people or things stand out by exaggerating them

Idiom –

It is a group of word established by usage as having a meaning not deducible from those of the individual words.

Examples -

idiom	meaning
Once in a blue moon	An event that happens infrequently
See eye to eye	Agreeing some one
When pigs fly	Something that will never happen
A piece of cake	Something is very easy
Let the cat out of the bag	To accidentally reveals a secret
To cut corner	To do something badly or cheaply
Giving someone the cold shoulder	To ignore someone
Call it a day	Stop working on something
